Vaccinations are an essential step towards a healthy immune system for your pet. Vaccines help prevent the spread of highly contagious diseases like rabies, feline leukemia, distemper, feline herpes, rhinotracheitis, calicivirus, and panleukopenia.

FeLV/FIV testing will be recommended for all kittens who have not previously been tested

### **FVRCP:**

Feline viral rhinotracheitis, calicivirus, and panleukopenia are three highly contagious viruses that cause respiratory and optical damage, infection, pneumonia, or life-threatening feline distemper. The virus is transmitted by saliva and eye or nose discharge of an infected cat. Infection can occur through direct contact with an infected cat or contact with inanimate objects that have been contaminated with viral particles.

### **FeLV:**

Feline leukemia is a virus acquired through the saliva, blood, urine or feces of an infected cat. The virus suppresses the immune system and can predispose cats to other infections.

### **Rabies:**

Rabies is a fatal and incurable disease that attacks the nervous system. The infection is acquired through exposure to saliva of an infected animal.
